PREFACE

The matter of these chapters was originally couched in the language of public addresses and, with slight revision, the form and arrangement have been left undisturbed.

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HE feeling that should predominate in America at this time is grief, not wrath. Since the world began there has been no such war. But the things now happening are too vast for spite and ancestral animosities, or even for the indulgence of moral indignation. What is it that has thrown civilization so suddenly out of its reckoning? Why this descent from the levels of culture and broadening brotherhood into the depths of brutality? Why do the peasants leave the harvests ungathered, to be themselves mowed down by a sharp, bloody scythe? Why are the gates of the universities closed? Why do the younger generation of scientists abandon their researches into the secrets of nature, prophetic of a beneficent extension of human knowledge,

Why do youths reared in all the gentleness of highbred social intercourse, suddenly take, as if they were beasts of the jungle, to the work of slaughter? The voice of lamentation is heard from Ramah; it is Rachel weeping for her children. It is the mother of humanity weeping for all those dead of many nations.

A great cloud has settled on the world. We are at the center of the darkness. But it behoves us to move from the center and seek to discover a ray of light, a ray of hope. Everyone at this time feels the immense desire to do something; to witness this unspeakable calamity and not stir a finger seems intoler-
