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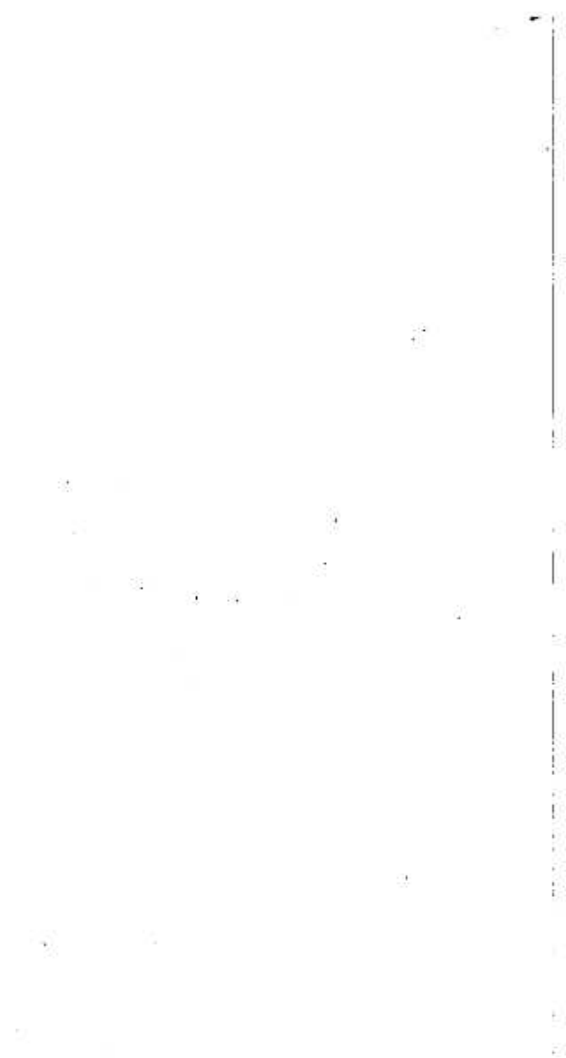


Figure 1: A graph showing the relationship between the number of people and the number of people per person.
