

## Times of Prager.

Always .- Our Lord.

At all times. - The Psalmist.

Without ceasing.—St. Paul.

He kneeled upon his knees three times a day, and prayed, and gave thanks.—Daniel.

Evening, and morning, and at noon, will I pray, and cry aloud: and He shall hear my voice.

Seven times a day do I praise Thee .- The Psalmist.

- In the morning, a great while before day.— Our Lord.
  - 2. The dawning of the morning.—The Psalmist.
  - 3. The third hour of the day .- St. Peter.
  - 4. About the sixth hour,-St. Peter.
- At the hour of prayer, the ninth.—St. Peter and St. John.
  - At the eventide,—Isaac.
- By night. Bless ye the Lord, all ye servants of the Lord, which by night stand in the house of the Lord.

At midnight I will rise to give thanks unto Thee.—The Psalmist.

### Places of Praper.

In all places where I record My name I will come unto thee, and I will bless thee.—The Lord to Moses.

That Thine eyes may be open toward this house night and day, even toward the place of which Thou hast said, My name shall be there: that Thou mayest hearken unto the prayer which Thy servant shall make toward this place.—Solomon.

As for me, I will come into Thy house in the multitude of Thy mercy: and in Thy fear will I worship toward Thy holy temple.

Hear the voice of my supplications, when I cry unto Thee, when I lift up my hands toward Thy holy oracle.

We have thought of Thy lovingkindness, O God, in the midst of Thy temple.—The Psulmist.

In the temple. They went up together into the temple.—St. Peter and St. John.

In the congregation. In the assembly of the upright, and in the congregation.—The Psalmist.

In the closet. Enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father Which is in secret.—Our Lord.

In the upper room. They went up into an upper room.—The Apostles.

On the housetop. He went up upon the housetop to pray.—St. Peter.

In bed. Let the saints be joyful in glory: let them sing aloud upon their beds.—The Psalmist.

On the shore. We kneeled down on the shore, and prayed.—St. Paul and the disciples at Tyre.

In the garden. He went forth over the brook Cedron, where was a garden, into the which He entered.

In the wilderness. He withdrew Himself into the wilderness, and prayed.

On the mountain. He went up into a mountain apart to pray.—Our Lord.

### Circumstances and Accompaniments of Prager.

He lifted up His eyes unto heaven.

He kneeled down and prayed.

He went a little farther, and fell on His face, and prayed.—Our Lord.

Moses made haste, and bowed his head toward the earth, and worshipped.

Our soul is bowed down to the dust,

our belly cleaveth unto the earth .- The Psalmist,

I am ashamed and blush to lift up my face to Thee, my God.—Ezra.

Standing afar off, he would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast.

—The Publican.

He came trembling .- The Philippian Jailor.

We mourn sore like doves .- Isaiah.

Mine eyes are ever toward the Lord.

I stretch forth my hands unto Thee.

Let the lifting up of my hands be as the evening sacrifice.—The Psalmist.

Lifting up holy hands, without wrath and doubting.—St. Paul.

All the day long have I been plagued, and chastened every morning.—The Psalmist.

For behold this selfsame thing, that ye sorrowed after a godly sort, what carefulness it wrought in you, yea, what clearing of yourselves, yea, what indignation, yea, what fear, yea, what vehement desire, yea, what zeal, yea, what revenge !—St. Paul.
