The Regius Professor of Medicine on asking the MARQUESS OF SALISBURY to accept the statue said—

MY LORD, on behalf of the Warden and two former fellows of All Souls College¹, the statue of THOMAS SYDENHAM, Fellow of All Souls for several years, in the troublous period of the Commonwealth, is offered two hundred years after his death through your Lordship, 'our honoured Lord and Chancellor,' to the University of Oxford. We beg the acceptance by the University of the statue, on the great occasion of a meeting, for the fourth time in Oxford, of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, under your
