REPORT.

GENERAL TREASURER'S OFFICE.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., January 1, 1909.

To the Honorable General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations:

Complying with the provisions of Chapter 33, Title VI, of the General Laws, I submit herewith a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the treasury department for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1908.

It has long been evident to those who have studied the financial condition of the State, as set forth in the yearly reports of the treasury department, that the time was near at hand when the current receipts would be insufficient to meet its expenditures. This condition confronts us to-day.

Additional funds are absolutely needed to carry on the affairs of the State, not because of unwise or extravagant legislation, but to meet the legitimate demands of a growing population for modern methods and facilities for the transaction of public business, and to provide the improvements and conveniences so essential, even indispensable, to a thriving and progressive community.
