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
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## FAMOUS FIRST REPRESENTATIONS.

#### CHAPTER I.

#### "THE ENGLISH MONSIEUR."

THE English Monsieur is not a very well-known work in the present day, but its first representation derives interest from the fact of its having served to introduce Nell Gwyn to the stage. The young orange-girl was already known to habitual playgoers, and there is probably no more familiar passage in Pepys's Diary than the one in which he speaks of his first interview with " pretty, witty Nell," as he calls her. The early life of this earliest of popular actresses does not bear examination.
