## REPORT.

#### GENERAL TREASURER'S OFFICE.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., January 1905.

To the Honorable the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations:

In compliance with the requirements of Chapter 33, Title VI, of the General Laws, I have the honor to submit a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the treasury department for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1904, the condition of the State House Sinking Fund, the Touro Jewish Synagogue Fund, the Land Grant Fund of 1862, and several other funds in custody of the State.

Reference to the statement of the condition of the general fund will show the expenditures of the State the past year have exceeded the receipts, and to meet the demands made upon the treasury the General Treasurer has been obliged to secure temporary loans approaching the limit permitted by law.

A liberal estimate of the income of the State for 1905 will amount, in round numbers, to \$1,663,000.00. Existing laws and fixed charges require appropriations for the objects named below:

In addition to the above the fixed charges of the State will be materially increased by the reorganization of the judiciary system, the completion and occupancy of the State Sanatorium, and the taking of a census of the population, manufactures, and business of the State, as required by Chapter 69 of the General Laws; and if appropriations are granted for the erection of a new court house, or for the extension and remodeling of the Providence County Court House, the completion of the Providence armory, and the continued improvement of State highways, they will not only absorb the gross income of the State for 1905 but make serious inroads in the receipts of 1906. The number of unfortunate and afflicted are also constantly increasing in our charitable and benevolent institutions, and to provide them with the best medical treatment, proper care and attention, agreeable and comfortable surroundings, makes no inconsiderable draft upon the revenue of the State.

These heavy demands upon the public purse can not fairly be attributed to prodigality or to a spirit of extravagance, but are due, in a large measure, to the legitimate demands of a growing population for modern methods and better facilities for the transaction of public business; for a higher standard, more supervision, and more
