RULES AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

Yellowstone National Park.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, Washington, July 1, 1888.

1. It is forbidden to remove or injure the sediments or incrustations around the geysers, hot springs, or steam vents; or to deface the same by written inscription or otherwise; or to throw any substance into the springs or geyser vents; or to injure or disturb in any manner, any of the mineral deposits, natural curiosities or wonders within the Park.

2. It is forbidden to ride or drive upon any of the geyser or hot spring formations, or to turn loose stock to graze in their vicinity.

3. It is forbidden to cut or injure any growing timber. Camping parties will be allowed to use dead or fallen timber for fuel.

4. Fires shall be lighted only when necessary, and completely extinguished when not longer required. The utmost care should be exercised at all times to avoid setting fire to the timber and grass.

Hunting, capturing, injuring, or killing any bird or animal within the Park is prohibited. The outfits of persons found hunting, or in possession of game killed in the Park, will be subject to seizure and confiscation

6. Fishing with nets, seines, traps, or by the use of drugs or explosives, or in any other way than with hook and line, is prohibited. Fishing for purposes of merchandise or profit is forbidden by law.

No person will be permitted to reside permanently or to engage in any business in the Park, without permission, in writing, from the Department of the Interior. The Superintendent may grant authority to competent persons to act as guides, and revoke the same at his discretion.

No drinking saloon or bar-room will be permitted within the

limits of the Park

9. Private notices or advertisements shall not be posted or displayed within the Park, except such as may be necessary for the convenience and guidance of the public, upon buildings on leased ground.

10. Persons who render themselves obnoxious by disorderly con-

duct or bad behavior, or who violate any of the foregoing rules, will be summarily removed from the Park, under authority of the Statute setting apart the Park "as a pleasuring ground for the people," and providing that it "shall be under the exclusive control of the Secretary of the Interior, whose duty it shall be to make and publish such rules and regulations as he shall deem necessary or proper," and who "generally shall be authorized to take all such measures as shall be necessary or proper to fully carry out the object and purposes of this act."
