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PREFACE.

In these pages one who has experienced many trials seeks to comfort and edify the traveller towards the heavenly rest. To the unconverted he addresses words of expostulation and warning. He has endeavoured to explain those passages of Holy Scripture which describe the future abodes of the saved and of the lost. Some of the views put forth have been for the first time published. The erroneous opinions of the Universalists have been controverted, while the Destructionists-who maintain that the ungodly, after passing through an awful judgment and a period of condemnation proportioned to their crimes, shall be destroyed with extinction of being-have been sufficiently confuted in course of the argument.
