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#### CHAPTER II.

He studies for the bar; is disgasted with the profession; enters the "Society of the Temple," where he is much appreciated; is sent by his father to Caën; gets into disgrace there; is sent to the Hague; falls in love with Mademoiselle Danoyer; is sent back to Paris at the close of 1713; his father's anger; is condemned to enter the office of an attorney; gains the friendship of Thiériot, a fellow clerk; leaves the office in a few months; competes without

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success for a prize offered by the French Academy; gains notoriety by a satire on the winner of the prize, entitled, "Le Bourhier"; begins his tragedy of "CEdipe," founded on the masterpiece of Sophoeles, and suggested by some private theatricals at the "Court of Sceaux"; for the supposed authorship of lampions against the Regent, is exiled to Tulle; by his father's intervention, is allowed to go to Sully instead; writes to the Duke of Orleans; is allowed to return to Paris in the autumn

#### CHAPTER III.

Takes lodgings; lampoons the Regent; makes friends and stays with M. de Caumartin; returns to Paris, and is imprisoned in the Bastille (May, 1717) for a year; begins "La Ligue," which grows afterwards into the "Henriade"; leaves Bastille, April 10, 1718, for Châtenay; changes his name to Voltaire; "CEdipe" is acted, with great success; Voltaire receives a pension from the Regent; writes letters to a friend, in which he criticizes Sophoeles's, Corneille's, and his own treatment of the subject of "CEdipe". . . 26

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#### CHAPTER X.

Voltaire roams about, and at last settles down at Les Délices, near Geneva, with Monrion, near Lausanne, for a winter resort ; writes the "Orphelin de la Chine"; is much impressed by the earthquake at Lisbon ; writes poem on it, showing that it has shaken his belief in Pope's " whatever is is right"; writes "Candide," in which he refers to Admiral Byng's execution ; the Seven Years' War begins ; Voltaire pities Frederick, and renews a correspondence with him ; purchases Ferney ; writes "History of Peter the Great"; undertakes the education of a grandniece of Corneille ; begins his warfare with "the Infamous One," which ends in direct attacks on Christianity .

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
