In the Assyrian Inscriptions, Abab is mentioned at a date—n.c. 854, Jebu in 842, Uzziah (probably) in 740, Menahem in 738, Pokah (as dethroned and succeeded by Hoshea) in 734 (so Schrader, K.A.T.³ p. 254 f.; but the year of Tiglath-pileser's reign is not actually given, the tablet being defective; and Rost, Die Keilschrift-texte Tiglat-pileser's III. 1893, pp. xxix., xxxx. f., prefers 733 or 732], the capture of Samaria by Sargon in 722. The precise dates assigned to the individual kings are in some cases more or less arbitrary; but it is evident that the Biblical dates must be considerably reduced in order to harmonize with the Assyrian data.
