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The main object the compiler had in publishing this list was to make more generally known the right of the 94th Regiment to its title, badge, and honours, and he is not aware that that right has ever before been publicly represented.

The colours of the regiment are unadorned by any of the emblems of its services, surely, it only requires a proper representation of the facts of the case, to have them restored. They cannot be denied on the ground that the regiment has been disbanded, or how was it the 13th Hussars, when re-formed in February 1858, had the words "Peninsula" and "Waloo" restored to them, after the regiment had been out of existence for 37 years, whilst the 94th was in that position only 6 years? In August 1861 the 42nd Regiment was permitted to assume its old national title—"The Black Watch"—even after a lapse of one hundred twenty years; and the 70th Regiment has, so late as December 1867, obtained the word "Guadeloupe," fifty-seven years after its services there. If, then, the present little work authenticating these facts should at all conduce to regain for the regiment its long-deferred honours, the compiler will feel highly compensated for his time and trouble. To forward the object, a friend* of the compiler wrote the record of the regiment, which was published in UNITED SERVICE MAGAZINE for October, November, and December 1868, and which has been favoured with commendation from several old officers of the corps.

To the following officers and gentlemen the compiler tenders his best thanks for information they have supplied him with, and particularly to Messrs. Thornton and Rutherford the only officers now living, who served with the "Scotch Brigade" in the Peninsula, and both reached the age of 80.

Served the Egyptian campaign of 1801, as aide-de-camp to the Earl of Cavan. Commanded the 13th regiment at the capture of Martinique in 1809. Joined the Duke of Wellington's army at Madrid, in 1812, and was immediately appointed to command a brigade in the 3rd division, in which corps he served until the end of the war with France, in 1814, and was present at the battles of Vittoria, Pyrennee, Nivelle, near Bayonne, and Orthes; action at Vic Bigorre, battle of Toulouse, and several minor affairs. In Aug. 1814, appointed to command a corps ordered for a particular service; and on arrival at Jamaica, being senior officer, assumed the command of the army destined to co-operate with Vice-Admiral the Hon. Sir Alex. Cochrane, for the attack on New Orleans and the Province of Louisiana. On the morning of the 23rd Dec. effected a landing within nine miles of New Orleans, and that night, with only 1,600 bayonets on shore, repulsed a serious attack of 5,000 of the enemy, assisted by three large armed vessels on their bank. Superseded on the 26th by the arrival of Major-General Sir Edward Packenham, who took the command of the army. Appointed, on the 26th, to the 3rd Brigade, and was present at the affairs of the 26th Dec. and 1st Jan., as also at the assault made on the enemy's fortified lines on the morning of the 8th Jan., 1815, when he was severely wounded in two places. Commanded the army in the field, during the campaign in Afghanistan and Belochistan, and was present at the assault and capture of Ghuznee. For these services he was raised to the peerage in Dec. 1838.

Served with the army in North Holland in the campaign of 1799; in Egypt in 1801; and with the British and Russian troops employed on the Neapolitan frontier in 1805. Served in Sicily and Calabria in the campaign of 1806, and was at the battle of Maida. Was Military Secretary to General Fox, Commander of the Forces in Sicily and the Mediterranean in 1805 and 1807, and to Sir John Moore—in Sicily, Sweden, and Portugal, and in Spain in the campaign of 1808-9, and at the battle of Corunna. Joined the army of Lord Wellington in 1809 in Spain at Jaramojo and was sent to La Mancha to report on the operations of the Spanish armies.—was at the battle of Ocaña. Commanded a brigade in Sir Rowland Hill's Division in the campaigns of 1810 and 1811, and was detached in command of the Brigade to Castel Branco to observe the movements of General Neymer's Corps d'Armée on the frontier of Portugal. Commanded a Brigade at the battle of Bussaco and on the retreat to the Lines of Torres Vedras, and occupied with this Brigade—outside the Lines—the town of Albandra and the advanced posts near Villa Franca during the time the army was in this position, and afterwards when Massena retired from the front of the Lines. Crossed the Tagna and had charge of the posts on that river opposite the French Corps at the confluence of the Zesere till the evacuation of Portugal by Massena. Commanded the advanced guard of Infantry and Cavalry at the combat of Campo Mayor in Portugal, and was detached in command of a Brigade and force of Artillery and Cavalry with orders to drive back the French outposts during the siege of Badajoz in 1811. Commanded a Brigade at the battle of Albuhera. In 1819 on the investment of Ciudad Rodrigo, commanded the force of the Light Division which stormed the Redoubt of San Francisco on the greater Tago, and the 2nd Light Infantry on the assault of the fortress and town. In 1813 commanded the 2nd Brigade of the Light Division at the attack of the French positions and entrenched camp on the heights of Vion, at the battles of the Nivelle and the Nive, and during the operations of the campaign in the Basque Provinces. Led the attack of the 2nd Light Infantry on Marshal Soult's position at the battle of Orthes in 1814. Commanded the 2nd Brigade of the Light Division at the combats of Vic Bigorre and Tarbes, and the 52nd at the battle of Toulouse. Was appointed Prince Regent's Aide de Camp in 1814 and Military Secretary to the Prince of Orange, Commander in Chief of the British Forces in the Netherlands. In 1815, commanded the 52nd Light Infantry at the battle of Waterloo, and a Brigade on the March to Paris. Has held the following appointments.—Lieut. Governor of Grenada; Lieut. Governor of Upper Canada, Commander of the Forces in Canada; Governor General of British North America; Lord High Commissioner in the Ionian Islands; and Commander of the Forces in Ireland. Has received the Grand Cross of the Bath, and of Hanover, and of St. Michael and St. George; the Order of Maria Theresia of Austria, of the Tower and Sword of Portugal, and of St. George of Russia. Was severely wounded at Ciudad Rodrigo.

Waterloo, and the capture of Paris.

Accompanied Sir James Craig's expedition to Malta and Naples in 1805, and served in Sir James's Light Battalion. Proceeded thence with the army which took possession of Sicily; served there four years was present at the capture of the Islands of Ichia and Procida. He joined the 3rd Battalion of his Regt. (the 27th) at Escalio in the north of Portugal in April previous to the campaign of 1813, and having command of the Light Company, he was actively employed previous to and at the battle of Vittoria, investment of P. Inna, battles of the Pyrenees at the Pass of Roncesvalles, heights of Linozain, heights above Pampeluna, etc. of the French position on the 30th July, and pursuit of the enemy until the 6th Aug. 1813; passage of the Bid heights above Vera. In command of the Light Companies of the right Brigade 4th Division, he commenced battle of the Nivelle by an attack upon the French advanced redoubt; in storming their main position his was killed under him; and in following them up drove them out of the village of St. Pée. He was also employed in the affairs at Garris's House and near Bayonne on the 10th and 13th Dec., and when the army was motion to repel the enemy's encroachment upon our winter position; also actively employed upon the high Bidassoa. Commanded the above-mentioned Light Companies at the battle of Orthez, battle of Toulouse previous day to which he took possession of the bridge over the river Eux, and the village of Croix d'Orade, had been captured by a charge of the 16th Hussars. Next morning he moved off his post and covered it in rear of the division upon Mont Blanc, and subsequently covered the flank movement of the columns to the right of the enemy, and also the advance of the division till it crowned the heights (where killed under) he then drove in the enemy's skirmishers, and took up a line to cover the columns till night. After the nation of the Peninsula war he embarked at Bordeaux with the 1st Battalion 27th Regt. for Canada; was present in all the operations on Lake Champlain, and covered the retreat from Plattsburg to Montreal. He was wounded present at the capture of Paris, and served in France with the Army of Occupation.
